

# DO YOU REMEMBER THE WHOLE EARTH CATALOG?

The Whole Earth Catalog was the brainchild of Stewart Brand. It was an oversized catalogue with a picture of the earth on the cover. Brand found out that NASA had a satellite photo of the earth, as seen from space, but had never released it. Brand pressured NASA to release the photo and it



became the cover of the Catalog. Brand felt the image would be a powerful symbol that we share a common destiny.

I remember spending/wasting countless hours looking at the Catalog while different colored candles dripped from a chianti bottle. Sounds elegant, doesn't it? Well, that was a popular past time in the early 70's.

Stewart Brand was interviewed recently in one of Tim Ferris' postcasts. This interview

made me start thinking about the Whole Earth Catalog. Although I spent countless hours looking at it, I shouldn't admit this, but I didn't really remember anything about it. My copy was long gone, so I ordered a used one from Ebay.

My copy of the "Updated Last Whole Earth Catalog-Access to Tools", was published in May of 1974. The original price was \$5.00, current Ebay price was \$45.00. The Catalog contains references to different books. It was all about survival.

The Whole Earth Catalog is arranged by topics, such as Land Use, Shelter, Industry, Craft, Community, Nomadics, Communications and Learning. In each section, it lists books you could order. Here are some examples:

- "Stalking the Healthful Herbs" by Euell Gibbons, cost \$2.95;
- "Dairy Goat Guide", cost \$3.00;
- "Horseshoeing", cost \$6.00;
- "Designing the Geodesic Dome", cost \$4.20;
- "Simplified Carpentry Estimating", cost \$6.95;
- "Handbook for Building Homes of Earth", cost \$3.00;
- "Direct Use of the Sun's Energy", cost \$1.95;
- "The Ashley Book of Knots", cost \$16.95;
- "Survival Evasion and Escape", cost \$6.05;
- "Outdoor Survival Skills", cost \$4.96;
- "Literary Essays of Ezra Pound", cost \$3.25;
- "Jonathan Livingston Seagull", cost \$1.50.


I will stop there, but you can see how you could lose yourself in this Catalog. Wonder what the 2017 version would look like?
